Thank you to everyone who participated in our Annual Meeting in January, and who takes an active role in all that Lebanon does. We do what we do because the world needs more grace, more kindness, more gentleness, more listening and more encouragement.

Encouragement is the word I think of to guide what I do. I know as a Lutheran it could have been grace, and I do want people to experience more grace, to give themselves. The grace to accept God's grace. We need that. We are all tired, stressed, worried about the future, and many other things that we, in our better moments talk about with one another.

I find the story of Jesus Christ encouraging. I find it interesting, and I hope you do too. When I see myself in Jesus' story, it makes me remember I have a story, a purpose, my life has a meaning. But it also makes me find other peoples' live and t heir stories interesting. And. The more "other" the person is, the more interesting their experience is, and the more of grace I find in it.

We think of God's grace as something we bring in our encounters, in our ministries. But even more than that, I find God's grace "discoverable", as already at work around us, already present and active, and -- well - gracious.

Ukraine and Flint. Students seeking what they will become in life, older people seeking what they will become in the next life. People who teach, who bring healing, who comfort, who feed, and people who sing. And people who find delight and hope in the story of Jesus. It is so painful to find someone for whom the story of Jesus has been presented in a way that is harmful, hurtful, damaging. It is a growing, vocal group that may not know that our way of telling the story is different.

I want us to be a light, a hopefulness, an encouragement. So that some day we can say together: the people who walked in darkness have seen a great light (Isaiah 9). I hope I do not walk in darkness from their stories. I want the light they bring when they express their need for just a little more grace, a little more light, a little more hope, and little more love.

And we walk together. "To loose the bonds of injustice, to undo the thong of the yoke, to let the oppressed go free. To share bread with the hungry, bring the homeless into a house (Isaiah 58). Happy 151st, Lebanon. Happy New Year!



Living Stones 2023 - 2025

Living Stones, which Synod Council endorsed in December 2018, provided a framework for our strategio initiatives for the last three-year period (2020/21-2028/23). We have found this framework helpful in directing and communicating the Synod's mission and the work of the Synod Staff, even during the pandemic years. We therefore provide a renewed Living Stone initiatives for the period of January 2023 through August 2028, which Synod Council endorsed at its December 2022 meeting and I am pleased to share with you.

Sharing the Story of Jesus: In response to the churchwide organization making vitality training free and online, our REVIVE team is providing online resources and consultation, and shifting our focus to sharing the story of Jesus.

- We will provide workshops, both in-person and via Zoom, to equip leaders to use the book, You Are
 Witnesses of These Things: Sharing the Story of Jesus (https://bit.ly/3DXlk2e). This will also be the focus of
 the 2023 Synod Assembly, which is themed "It's About Jesusi"
- We will continue to support our Sudanese worshiping community and our campus ministry in Grand Rapids, and remain vigilant to opportunities for other synodically authorized worshiping communities.
- We will continue to actively pursue opportunities to engage Latino and Native American communities on
 the territory of our synod in the hope that we experience the love of Jesus through our listening to and
 learning from them.

Call Process: We anticipate an increasing number of congregational vacancies as many of our pastors are approaching retirement and, in the aftermath of the pandemic, pastors are desixing to move closer to family, and congregations are seeking a change in pastoral leadership because of irreconcilable differences with their current pastor. We will need to attract candidates to our synod and help congregations re-calibrate their expectations to attract a pastor.

Sustainability: Struggling congregations and synod ministries receive accompaniment and assistance to realistically assess their sustainability and, where appropriate, to either partner with neighboring congregations, both ELCA and full communion partners, or to move toward holy closure.

Adult Theological Education: We will provide a six-week course via Zoom for adults (lay and rostered) in each of the next five "semesters." Our first course on the Corinthian Correspondence with Dr. Walter F. Taylor, Jr. began January 10. We are excited at the overwhelming interest in the course, with 96 people registering. The Fall 2023 course will be on Luther's Small Catechism and will be taught by Dr. Kit Kleinhans.

Candidates for Public Ministry: 20 candidates for rostered ministry are identified, accompanied, and supported. With the elimination of the first call "draft," the first call pastors we receive in our synod will be the ones we produce. We have generous scholarship money available for seminarians and need to find ways to better identify and invite people, especially young adults, to consider a call to public ministry. I would like to hold such an event in the next 18 months.

Rostered Minister Debt Reduction: Rostered ministers are relieved of some measure of educational indebtedness. This is the most successful of our original Living Stones initiatives. The program will continue as long as there is a need and available funds.

Saying Thanks: Congregations leading and growing in their mission support of our synod, together with individuals committed to the Living Stones financial initiative, are honored and thanked at Mission Support Dinner.

Welcome: Our synod makes a renewed commitment to discuss ways to welcome all God's people.

- Building on the 90 people who participated in the Introduction to Social Justice course and the group who
 participated in the White Feople Doing their Work course, we will develop and implement a plan for helping
 our Synod address radial justice.
- Our Ministry with Persons with Disabilities Task Force will offer additional training and consultation with congregations. The Task Force is also applying for a holy innovations grant to help us address issues related to ministry with persons who live with disabilities.
- We will encourage and facilitate our synod's participation in the churchwide review and revision of the ELCA social statement, "Human Sexuality Gift and Trust." Our "Open Hearts, Open Church" Task Force is available to consult with congregations considering becoming Reconciled in Christ.

Youth

- We will continue to support Living Water Ministries, and their summer camps and other youth events, as the
 foundation for youth ministry in our synod. We will also work to help our synod better understand that our
 primary way of supporting youth ministry throughout the Synod is through Living Water Ministries.
- We will encourage and facilitate our congregations' participation in the 2024 ELCA Youth Gathering in New Orleans, including MYLE, the tAble, and the Young Adult Gathering.

Living Stone Contributors:

• Synod Council and I are very grateful for the commitment and generosity of individuals who financially contributed to the original Living Stone initiatives. We are even more inspired by those who have communicated their intention to continue to financially support our synod directly, in addition to giving to their congregations. This is certainly Cathy's and my intention. We understand that these are financially challenging times for congregations and families. Therefore, rather than set a goal, we will provide regular invitations and opportunities for individuals to contribute directly to the work of our synod and these initiatives.

After a season in which my primary, even exclusive, synod work was addressing COVID-19 and congregational conflict, the Synod Staff and I are excited for this work. We look forward to the new year and serving alongside you as together we prayerfully participate in Christ's own work of reconciling the world (all creation?) to God's very self.
