"And I said to the man who stood by the gate of the year, 'Give me a light that I may tread safely into the unknown.' And he replied, 'Go out into the darkness and put your hand into the hand of God. That shall be to you better than light And safer than a known way.'

I heard this poem years ago, when it was being set to music -- the first part, the plea in a minor key, the second part, the response in a major, calming, reassuring style.

The entire poem was read as a part of the radio address in 1939 by King George VI. Midnight church services were cancelled in Britain that year to "black out" the stained-glass windows without damaging them. Carolers could not use handbells, and chorale services at Westminster Abbey were cancelled, as the choirboys had all been evacuated from London. It was widely received as a source of comfort and hope. It remained important to Queen Elisabeth II all her life.

Written over a hundred years ago by Minnie Louise Haskins, it may not provide as much comfort as it once did – images such as "the hand of God" need a lot more unpacking if they are to have real meaning for us, and even the word "God" does not convey the reassurance that it once did. And there seems to be a lot of darkness. And yet it reassures me that "going out into the darkness" has been done before, and is worth doing. As we stand at the gate of another year, known ways will not solve our problems, nor relieve our fears. We need something more reassuring to hang onto than how things have always been – that way is no longer safe, nor possible. Something more solid, something that lies within us. A resolve, a hope, a deep breath before we begin, a leaning into the wind, a confidence in knowing what we stand for and what we must act upon. And hand-in-hand is better than being alone.

I believe that the story of Jesus Christ is the story of God's confidence in us, the gift from God to us that we have what it takes to make our way, the reassurance that there is enough grace to see us through. In Advent vespers we sang, "deep on our hearts may the light of your Christ be burning bright." Allow yourself a little grace as you pass through the gate into this year. You've been given it. Unwrap it like a gift, the wrap up in it like a blanket.



Advent Colors

In the last few weeks, I've had a number of conversations about the color of Advent, since Advent can be either purple or blue. The color purple is meant to suggest penitence; the color blue is intended to inspire hope. The third candle on the Advent wreath is sometimes pink or rose to suggest joy. Purple is the older color and rose works best with purple to suggest a joyous respite from a penitent Advent. Besides, to me, pink and blue insinuate a reveal party for baby Jesus, which Advent is not.

My Advent observation is that purple and blue are "both/and" rather than "either/or," We are motivated to be penitent—feeling or showing sorrow and regret for having done wrong—by either fear or hope. Together, purple and blue remind us that our penitence, our repentance, is motivated by hope. And that reminds us, that the One who "will come again to judge the living and the dead" is Emmanuel, God-with-us, lying in a manger and dying on a cross. Jesus loves us, becomes one of us, and gives himself for us, no matter what.

This is good news because we have some repenting to do. More than feeling, and showing sorrow or regret, for what we have done wrong, we need to turn around. We need to return to God. We need to change in every area of our life. Fear tries to seduce us to get back to business, as usual, to doing what we've always done, Fear scares us with things that are different to the point that we seek to eliminate the agent of change (ask Jesus). Fear dresses up as hope and tries to convince us that, if we do this or that, or if we don't do this or that, we will get what we want, which is usually getting back to the way things were.

Advent hope is not wishing on a star that things will turn out as we want. Advent hope is the good news that, come what may, Jesus is with us, and the future is securely in God's hands. Advent hope makes us brave, even daring. Advent hope does not make repenting and changing easy, painless, or free of grief. True repentance and change is hard, costly, and heartbreaking. Advent hope assures us that God is on our side, Jesus is with us, and the Holy Spirit directs and empowers us.

So Advent brings us to the Jordan, where, behind all the bluster, John the Baptist calls us to change. How wondrous that John is trying to motivate us to change with fear when Jesus came to bring us hope. So hope enough to be pentlent. Hope enough to repent, to turn around, to return to God. Hope enough to change, Dare to hope that much. It's Advent.



Charitable Contributions from IRAs

Did you know that, if you are at least 70 ½ years old, you can make tax-free charitable donations directly from your IRA? By making what's called a qualified charitable distribution (QCD), you can benefit your favorite charity (for example your church) while excluding up to \$100,000 annually from gross income. These gifts would otherwise be taxable IRA distributions.

How do I make a Qualified Charitable Distribution?


