Yet still the unresting castles thresh In full-grown thickness every May Last year is dead, they seem to say, Begin afresh, afresh





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### Walking Our Way Through Easter

So how do you suppose Cleopas and his companion walked as they made their way along from Jerusalem to Emmaus? Did they meander mindlessly, lost in conversation? Or, determined to get out of Dodge, did their steps possess a certain spirit? Luke doesn't tell us. What we do know is that disappointment and despair affect us all differently.

Were you lucky...I guess I should say, were you "blessed"? Were you blessed enough to get caught up in the spirit of resurrection this Easter? How long did the feeling last? God has blessed you if you're still feeling it weeks later!

For too many of us, Easter worship was followed too quickly by the return of concerns. At some level, we wait for the bomb in the street, the phone call from the school, or the next breaking news. We have been confronted by the power of nature to destroy us. And we have come to be concerned that we might not be in control when the time comes for us to die. If we do a quick comparison between what the Gospel promises and what the Church delivers, we'll find ourselves lacking. And we have always been concerned about the past and about the future; we have always been concerned about the world around us and the secret thoughts and desires within us.

While we may not be ready to join Cleopas and his companion in saying, "But we had hoped that Jesus was the one to redeem Israel," we might be ready to admit that we had hoped that this would be the Easter when the whole world was redeemed. Looking for signs of resurrection leaves us wanting. We find ourselves shuffling along aimlessly or swaggering our way elsewhere, determined to get out of Dodge.

It's then, as we walk our way through Easter, that the risen Jesus overtakes us. Wouldn't it be great if the risen Christ turned the world upside down? But no, that's never been Jesus's style. Instead, Jesus asks us a simple question: "What are you discussing with each other as you walk along?" The question is so simple, so basic, that we don't recognize who is really asking it. Instead we see only a friend, a colleague, a teacher, a student, a loved one, a stranger.

"What are you discussing with each other as you walk along?" The question is so basic that it stops us dead in our tracks. "Don't you get it?" We ask. The world is exploding, the Church is in ruins, my self-worth is sinking, my family is in trouble. While Cleopas and his companion may have not gotten it that "the Messiah should suffer these things and then enter into his glory," we sometimes fail to get it that Christ's glory may not be in keeping with our expectations either for Jesus or for us. And Christ's glory might not arrive according to when we think Christ's glory should have happened, which, of course, is by now. And so our post-Easter walk home to Emmaus hasn't changed that much in two thousand Easters.

And, thankfully, neither has the risen Christ. Beginning, not with Moses, but with creation and flood, Abraham and Sarah, and all the family stories that we tell at the Great Vigil, Jesus speaks to and through us to declare that God will always, always, always, bring light out of darkness, hope out of despair, speech out of silence, peace out of violence, power out of weakness, dignity out of degradation, and life out of death.

Opening the scriptures to us, Jesus risen opens our hearts as well. We feel our hearts burn within us, daring us to trust when trust is stupid; to believe when belief is foolish; to risk when risk in dangerous; to dream when the dream is lunacy. And if words are not enough, the risen Jesus gives us more—bread broken, the risen Christ revealed to us, at least for an instant, long enough for us to know that Jesus is here.

No, we are not told how Cleopas and his companion made their way to Emmaus that first Easter. We are told how they made their way back to Jerusalem. After the seven-mile journey, they rose at that very hour and returned. And so it is with us. It's only after we've been overtaken by the risen Jesus that we can authentically share the good news. It's only after we've experienced the risen Christ that we are empowered to go and be sent.

As we walk our way through Easter, it's not about straining to see signs of resurrection. It's about being overtaken by the risen Christ who asks what's on our hearts and minds. And, when we dare to tell him, this Jesus reveals to us God's living and loving presence in our midst. While we cannot know all the places that Jesus will overtake us as we walk our way through Easter and journey to our Emmaus, Jesus promises to be here when the Word is opened and when bread is broken and shared in Christ's name. Whatever our road to our Emmaus, Jesus will overtake us, moving us from sadness to joy, from despair to new hope, to witness to new life. For Christ is risen! Risen indeed!
