
Revenge, aggression, and retaliation are responses all-too human to three basic human emotions: greed, fear and panic, responses we need to be saved from, whether they rise up in ourselves, or whether they become the common practice of factions in power.

There is a Lutheran style of being Christian, which is dramatically different from the loudest voices in our culture calling themselves Christian. I do nor not doubt their sincerity, nor criticize them following what they believe their God is saying to them. It just isn't a god I recognize when God is revealed as Emanuel – God-with-us, Jesus Christ, the one born a Christmas. That a Lutheran style includes receiving the events of each day as a gift, some gifts harder to accept, of course, than others.

This coming year ,ay test the strength of our convictions:

- That peacemakers are blessed;
- That the meek have an honored place;
- That those in grief deserve space;
- That mercy is a strength;
- That righteousness is worth the pursuit;
- That persecution is sometimes a sign that you're doing it right;
- That God stands with those in need; especially the widow, the orphan, the stranger who sojourns in your land;
- That there aren't many rules on how to make a success out of your life, but doing right by children is one of them; that the leading cause of harm for children is still gun violence. And so we will continue to support and advo cate for the immigrant child, the foster child, the lonely or isolated child, the Giving Tree child, the Toys for Tots child, the Kids Klub child, the Scouting child.

Gaudete: Rejoice!

How Disaster Recovery Works 2025 Synod Assembly The Third Sunday in Advent, when we light the pink candle on our Advent wreath, is Gaudete Sunday. This year, it falls on December 15. Gaudete is Latin for rejoice. The name comes from the appointed Second Reading from Philippians: "Rejoice in the Lord always; again I will say, Rejoice. Let your gentleness be known to everyone. The Lord is near. Do not worry about anything, but in everything by prayer and supplication with thanksgiving let your requests be made known to God" (4:4-7). Why, with all the holiday hype, Hallmark movies, and ho-ho-ho-ing, do we need the church to remind us to rejoice?

The season of Advent originated as a fast of 40 days in preparation for Christmas. Advent was a kind of "little Lent." So the color was, and in some places still is, purple. In the ninth century, the duration of Advent was reduced to four weeks (a period starting four Sundays before Christmas) while still preserving most of the characteristics of a penitential season. Advent provides a break that signifies the nearness of the Lord's coming and the joy and gladness that Christ will bring.

Gaudete Sunday reminds us to rejoice in the Lord. Such joy flows from confidence and trust that God is God, that the God revealed in Jesus Christ loves us, forgives us, and intends for us and for the world abundant life. Such joy transcends circumstance and motivates and empowers us to be gentle to everyone, not worry about anything, and in everything let our needs be made known to God. This joy is not something we will or conjure. Rather, this joy wells up in us as we contemplate the God revealed in Jesus Christ and engage in acts of charity or love. In his 2014 Gaudete Sunday homily, Pope Francis said that Gaudete Sunday is known as the "Sunday of Joy" and that instead of fretting about "all they still haven't done" to prepare for Christmas, people should "think of all the good things life has given you."[i]

Decades ago, I always spent time on Gaudete Sunday flipping through catalogs, looking at pink or rose vestments. The time has long passed for me to acquire such liturgical splendor. Besides, I would much rather wear the beautiful purple stole and cope that Christine Allen made for me. This year, I got to wear them at Chris's home church, Trinity in Kalamazoo. Nevertheless, Gaudete Sunday invites us to do four important things in the 10 days before Christmas.

First, spend time contemplating the God made known to us in Jesus Christ. I like to spend time examining a creche or nativity set, holding each piece in my hand. Then I read the Christmas Gospel from John (1:1–14) aloud. Then sing or recite a verse from your favorite or most meaningful Christmas carol. I always turn to the final verse of "O Little Town of Bethlehem." See how slowly you can do this.

Second, pray and have an honest conversation with God. Open your heart. Name your fears. State your needs. Most important, listen. The Office of Bishop changed my prayer. I spend much more time sitting in silence with open hands than speaking to God. More precisely, I speak best to God after a long listening spell.



Third, engage in charity or love. Make it more than a random act of kindness. Build anticipation by planning and deliberating. Perhaps do it as a family or a group of friends. If it all possible, do something that puts you in direct human contact. There is a world of difference between bringing food to the food pantry and serving food at the food pantry.

Fourth, don't fret about all you have to do. Do something to make Christmas special for those you love. And avoid the trap of thinking that Christmas will be ruined if one detail isn't perfect or one expectation goes unmet. Take all the energy that you would spend fretting and scurrying and, as Pope Francis suggests, use it to "think of all the good things life has given you."[ii]

Cathy, Chelsey, and I will be together for Christmas—something I haven't taken for granted since the pandemic. It is the only thing I need to make Christmas special and, except for Jesus, the best thing life has given me. I pray that you find such clarity this Christmas, that you are filled with joy, and led to rejoice.
