Pastor’s Note

January 1, 2026

“And I said to the man who stood at the gate of the year,
‘Give me a light that I may go safely into the unknown.’

And he replied, ‘Go out into the darkness

and put your hand into the hand of God.

That will be to thee better than light,

and safer than a known way”

This is the first part of a poem by Minnie Louise Haskins in 1908. The entire poem was read by King George VI in his Christmas broadcast for 1939. “The darkness” for King George was the early days of the Second World War.

Our synod has a newly elected Bishop, the Reverend Julie Schneider-Thomas, and the ELCA has a new Presiding Bishop in Bishop Yehiel Curry. Julie recently served as Pastor in Grand Rapids, Yehiel as Bishop of Metro Chicago Synod. We will hear more from them in the years to come, and I look forward to their leadership. At the end of 2025, Lebanon’s Church Council made a gift to Bishop’s Discretionary Fund of our Synod, and to ELCA Living Water Ministries, which is the camping ministry of our synod. It is truly a delight that Lebanon has the resources to make these gifts and is such a staunch supporter of “Lutheran things”.

Our support for Samaritas is driven by a long-standing commitment to refugees and displaced persons. There is some debate among some Christians whether Jesus and his family were refugees in what we call “The Flight into Egypt” story Matthew 2:13-23.

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We also recall when after World War II some 20 to 25 percent of all the Lutherans in the world were refugees or displaced. The work of Lutheran World Relief and Lutheran Immigration and Refugee Services grew out of that experience. The work today continues with AAMPARO, the ELCA ministry to support unaccompanied minors refugeeing into the United States. Samaritas is the major player in our synod for these international ministries, in addition to Samaritas' work for foster care kids, and affordable housing facilities,

Look for us to make another hundred personal care kits starting February 11, 2026, which is Ash Wednesday, the beginning of Lent

Through the Lutheran benefit work of Thrivent Financial we have a huge stack of boxes near the organ containing personal water filters and personal solar lights. Thrivent connects us to helpful projects around the world. For the water filters Thrivent has connected us to Wine to Water, a global non-profit serving communities in disaster-stricken areas with chronic water scarcity. With access to clean water, health problems are reduced, and fewer people are forced to migrate away from home. For the solar lights, Thrivent connected us to WeHero, which makes the lights available to children who will no longer have to do homework while breathing in kerosene fumes when the village generators are turned off. These lamps provide 7300 extras study hours over three years.

We begin assembling at 9:00 am, January 11, 2026, and continue into fellowship time after worship. While the lights are a little trickier than the filters, the hardest part for most people has been the personal note you get to write to accompany them on their way.

Lutheran World Relief also gets the benefit of our quilting group, meeting Monday mid morning. Ruth, Donna, Meg, Carol, Mary are your best contacts if you would like to help.

These are just some of the things we will be thankful for in worship. We see these as God-opportunities, and maybe Lutherans sometimes forget to give thanks that there is so much we can do to make lights in the darkness, these opportunities to put our hands into the hand of God.

So . . . Thanks be to God for the inexpressible gift of being church together in 2026.

Using Our Gifts for Ministry - Pr. Alex Aivars

For as in one body we have many members and not all the members have the same function, so we, who are many, are one body in Christ, and individually we are members one of another. We have gifts that differ according to the grace given to us: prophecy, in proportion to faith; ministry, in ministering; the teacher, in teaching; the encourager, in encouragement; the giver, in sincerity; the leader, in diligence; the compassionate, in cheerfulness. I've been running from using my technology skills in ministry, ever since I first felt the call.

When I met with the synod candidacy person almost 12 years ago as I was discerning the call to ministry, I was told that it was going to be helpful that I had another skill set to use while being in ministry. I remember thinking, "nope, once I become ordained, I will never use my technology skills again."

When I started seminary, I firmly believed that my days working in technology were behind me. However, not two months in, the on-campus job I ended up with was working on the internal website for the Lutheran School of Theology at Chicago. I remember thinking, "this will only be while I'm in school, once I graduate, I will never use my technology skills again."

When I graduated and then moved through the first-call process, the church that wanted to call me, and the one I felt called to, was a half-time call in Lansing at St. Stephen Lutheran Church. In order to make it work financially, I would need other part-time work. Free-lance web development work would be the easiest for me to do, so that is what I did. I remember thinking, "this will only be until I am in a full-time ministry call. Then I will never use my technology skills again."

Then the pandemic hit. My technology skills would be vital in figuring out how to livestream our worship services and how to stay connected when we had to stay physically apart.

While in my second call at Christ United, another part-time call, I continued doing free-lance web development work off and on.

Then, Bishop-elect Julie Schneider-Thomas called and asked if I'd be on her staff as the Director of Technology.

I realized I needed to stop running. I accepted the position.

We can use our gifts for the church in many different ways.

Some of us are called to be pastors and deacons. Some of us are called to be lay leaders. Some of us are called to be musicians. Some of us are called to be greeters.
